On the 2nd of February 1971 in the city of Ramsar the Convention on Wetlands was signed, setting up an international framework for the protection of wetlands. As a result. the 2nd of February is celebrated as World Wetlands Day, and in 2019 the theme of the celebration is very close to our hearts in the CANAPE project. The theme of today is 'Wetlands and Climate Change.'

As we are moving into year 2 of our project, we are looking forward to promoting our achievements and sharing the opportunities we discover along the way. Therefore this week seems the ideal time to launch our new quarterly newsletter. Each newsletter will summarise our recent achievements, and set out what we hope to achieve in the next few months.

The last six months has seen construction work start at several sites, with excavators rolling onto site in Denmark and Germany, and being floating into place in the UK. The end of October marked the beginning of work in the CANAPE project to restore the reedswamp at Hickling Broad. Over the next 3 winters Broads Authority teams will work to construct a 1ha area of reedswamp on the edge of the broad, in an area that has been named "Chara Bay."





Upcoming Activities

- Our Biochar retort will arrive a the Broads Authority, ready to trial the creation of charcoal and Biochar from wetlands
